Strengthening our focus on Culture

December 2025

Our Annual Plan focuses on three key areas: Competence, Character and Culture. Here's what we've been doing so far to strengthen CULTURE.

Communicate and support whānau with attendance

Every day Attendance matters!

We work hard to support our whānau to meet our attendance expectations which are aligned with the Ministry of Educations STAR attendance goals. Our dedicated Attendance team meet weekly to put in place practical supports, strategies and school wide rewards to positively impact attendance at GPS. These include class and team challenges, treats, and rewards. Reminders and celebrations are shared with tamariki and whānau daily and weekly through FB.





Rumaki kaiako capability

Rumaki Kaiako have engaged with Rangaranga Reo for their Ākomonga. This rich Professional Development opportunity has meant our Kaiako and Kaiāwhina have been able to implement an effective structured literacy approach to better meet the needs of their learners.









Te Reo Māori lessons in all classes

We have implemented Te Reo Māori lessons across all of our mainstream classes.

The development of learning progressions has meant our kaiako are supported, while engaging in weekly lessons themselves so that they are learning and alongside their ākonga.

Involvement for Migrant families

We have focused on strengthening current practices to create opportunities for migrant families to celebrate their culture, language, and heritage. This has led to a range of meaningful cultural events, including an ESOL whānau hui, Diwali and Festival of Light celebrations, an ESOL whānau breakfast, a Southeast Asian whānau dinner, and a Pasifika and Filipino whānau dinner.

Support for ESOL learners

All ESOL learners have a targeted support programme, including one-to-one and small-group sessions. The introduction of structured literacy and personalised learning plans has had a positive impact. Conversational skills and comprehension have been strengthened through twice-weekly sessions for learners and their whānau, held before school in an informal setting.
